## MESSAGE: Connecting to nature along a ribbon of wilderness

Drawn by the mission of the Bruce Trail Conservancy (BTC), Laura moved to Dundas, Ontario, ten years ago to work for the organization. She works with a small team of staff and volunteers to increase awareness of and support for the BTC.

Spring is here. Its exuberant, rejuvenating signs are all around us. Flowers are blossoming; trees are unfurling their brilliant green leaves; birds are joining the dawn chorus. Just witnessing these small signs can make us feel revitalized.

Every spring, the Bruce Trail comes alive – beginning in Niagara and surging like a wave of budding, blooming and buzzing life to the Trail's northern tip in Tobermory. The excitement and anticipation in the air are palpable.

Yet this spring has been unusual, to say the least. Our world has been shaken by the COVID-19 pandemic. We find ourselves indoors far more than we might choose, and isolated from others in ways unlike ever before. To reduce the spread of the virus in and between communities, we have been staying off the Bruce Trail and away from other outdoor destinations.

Times like this bring into stark focus those things which are most important to us. For many, spending time outdoors connecting with the natural world is key to our physical and mental well-being. Now, as natural areas reopen, we are eager to reconnect.

We are fortunate in this area to have the natural spaces of the Niagara Escarpment at our doorstep. We can explore deep forests, stunning waterfalls, cooling caves and soaring cliffs – all in Canada's most densely populated region. For this we have an earlier generation to thank.

In the 1960s, a committed group of citizens in the Hamilton/Halton area was concerned about the loss of natural areas due to increasing resource extraction on the Niagara Escarpment, and

about the lack of opportunities for people to connect with nature. They conceived of an incredible idea, a footpath along the length of the Niagara Escarpment. This footpath would not only give people a way to experience the wonders of the Escarpment, it would inspire a desire to protect it. This became the Bruce Trail.

As a grassroots movement, those early volunteers founded the Bruce Trail Association (now the Bruce Trail Conservancy) and began bringing communities together to build trail, work with landowners, and protect the Niagara Escarpment for future generations.

Today, the Bruce Trail Conservancy (BTC) maintains over 1300 km of trails and is one of Ontario's most active land trusts. Over 1400 volunteers, supported by a small staff, work together to plan, build, and promote the Bruce Trail, and acquire and steward a growing number of protected natural areas.

The Bruce Trail runs like a ribbon along the Niagara Escarpment through private land, parks, conservation areas, and BTC-protected natural areas. Hikers can access the trail at over 300 different locations and follow its white rectangular trail markers with the help of Bruce Trail maps, or led by a volunteer hike leader from one of the nine Bruce Trail clubs.

Many of you have likely explored the Bruce Trail, perhaps without even realizing it, as you sought opportunities to walk in nature with friends or family. Perhaps you are already a member or volunteer of the Bruce Trail Conservancy. If so, thank you. As you may know, the work of the BTC is funded not through government dollars, but through the committed support of Bruce Trail Conservancy members and donors.

Since the Bruce Trail has been around for over 50 years, it can be tempting to think of it as a permanent, unchanging footpath winding through protected land. However, 32% of the Bruce Trail is still vulnerable to development.

Increasing demand for land along the Niagara Escarpment means that the remaining greenspace is ever more precious. At the same time, as society becomes increasingly disconnected from the natural world, the risk of losing it altogether is great. Not only does this mean loss of unique habitats and species, but also loss of the important ecological services that natural areas provide like clean water, clean air, climate regulation, and opportunities for physical and mental renewal.

Each year the BTC preserves more of this irreplaceable Niagara Escarpment along the Bruce Trail through purchasing land and accepting donations of land. With the support of members and donors, the BTC is ever closer to its vision of the entire Bruce Trail secured on permanently protected natural land.

Right now, for example, the BTC is fundraising to create two new nature reserves – Skinner's Woods near Owen Sound, and Lime Kiln Bluffs near Collingwood. Like crucial puzzle pieces, these newly protected areas will ensure the connectivity of habitats for wildlife to thrive. Along with over 12,000 acres already entrusted to the BTC, their unique escarpment ecosystems will be stewarded in perpetuity using best management practices. And along the

Bruce Trail these areas will provide further opportunities for us to explore the escarpment's many riches.

All along the Niagara Escarpment, the Bruce Trail will continue to provide a haven for people and for wildlife, thanks to the thousands of volunteers, members, donors and landowners who make it a reality.
